## **Survey Shows EHS Managers Are Appreciated by Companies**

Environmental health and safety managers are perceived as doing a valuable job. That's the conclusion of a study that showed 75 percent of 470 respondents in a Business and Legal Reports, Inc., online survey agreed with the statement that their organizations see the value in their EHS activities.

The survey showed that 77 percent reported that expectations for EHS have increased over the past five years. Full results of the survey may be downloaded at www.blr.com/80502500/PRS7.

The report also showed that of those taking part, only half report that they regularly communicate the business value of their environmental or safety activities.

When asked to relay the biggest onthe-job headaches, 24 percent of EHS managers listed paperwork and red tape, 14 percent referred to problems getting upper management buy-in, and 27 percent reported problems with employee training and compliance. More managers also reported that their budgets are increasing (38 percent) than decreasing (20 percent).
